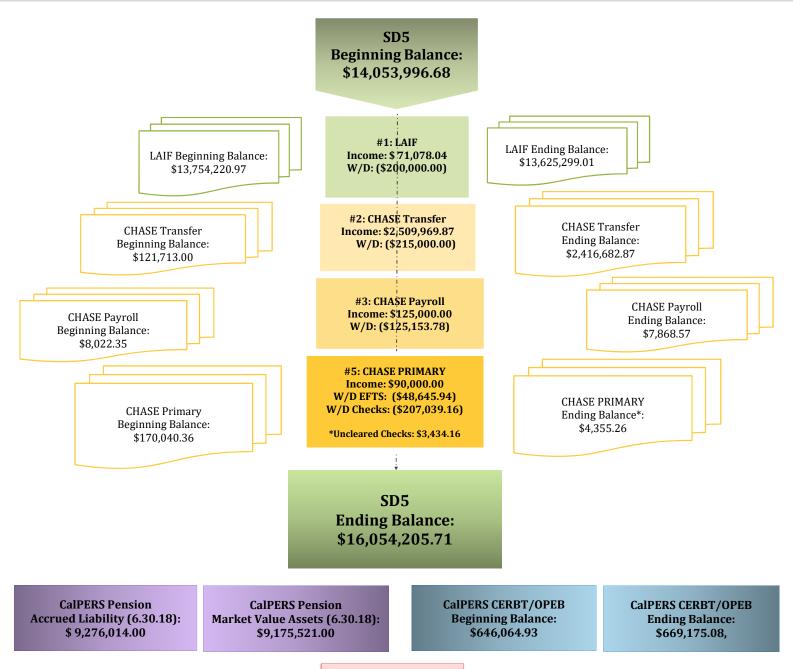

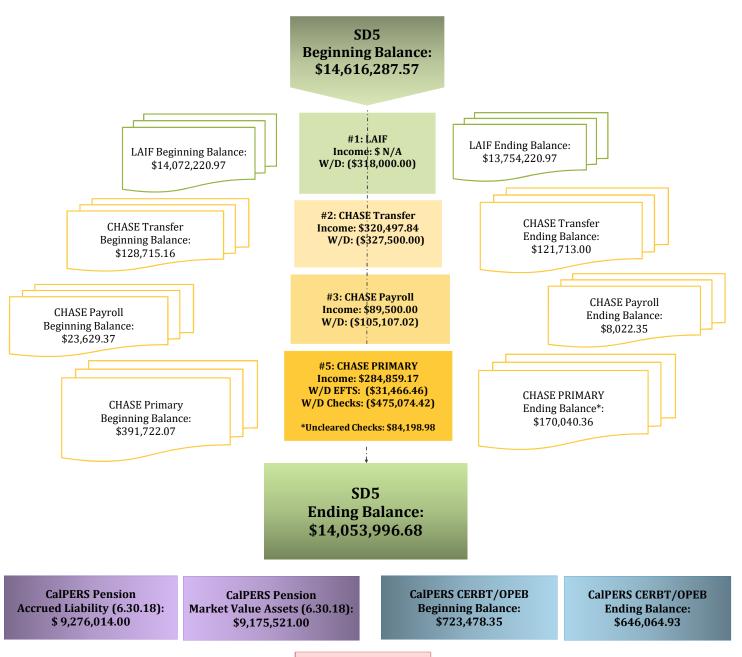

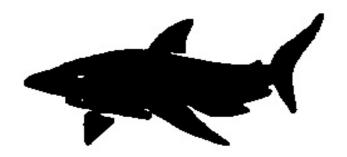

#### Significant Events for the Month of April 2020 Include:

#### Financial/Budgetary/Business Administration

- Fiscal Year 2020-2021 budget preparation continues
- Commercial Water use is down for calendar year 2019 (preliminary figures show a decrease in commercial revenue of about \$32,575 for fiscal year 2020-2021) Please note that 3 high strength commercial customers were out of business for the majority of 2019-Guaymas, lily kai and the caprice. Sam's was down for renovations as well for the first part of 2019.
- Working on budget estimate shortfalls for Fiscal year 2021-2022 as a result of Covid-19 business shutdowns.

#### Glossary of Terms

- **B.O.D.** (Biochemical Oxygen Demand): Measurement of the effluent's capacity to consume dissolved oxygen to stabilize all remaining organic matter. The permit limits for our effluent for discharge into San Francisco bay require that we remove 85% influent B.O.D. and meet a weekly average of less than 45mg/l and a monthly average of less than 30 mg/l B.O.D.
- TSS (Total Suspended Solids): Measurement of suspended solids in the effluent. Our permit requires that we move at least 85% of the influent TSS and that the effluent limit is less than 45 mg/l as a weekly average and less than 30 mg/l as a monthly average.
- **Chlorine Residual:** The plant effluent is disinfected with hypochlorite (chlorine "bleach") and then the residual chlorine is neutralized with sodium bisulfite to protect the bay. The effluent chlorine residual limit is 0.0 mg/l which we monitor continuously.
- **pH:** pH is a measurement of acidity with pH 7.0 being neutral and higher pH values being basic and lower pH values being acidic. Our permit effluent pH must stay within the range of 6.0-9.0, which we monitor continuously.
- **Coliform:** Coliform bacteria are the indicator organism for determination of the efficiency of the disinfection process. The lab culture samples of our effluent and the presence of coliform is an indication that pathogenic organisms may be present. This is reported as MPN/100 (number of coliform bacteria in 100 milliliters sample).
- **Flow Through Bioassay:** A 96 hour test in which we test the toxicity of our effluent to tiny fish (sticklebacks) in a flow through tank to determine the survivability under continuous exposure to our effluent. Our permit requires that we maintain a 90<sup>th</sup> percentile survival of at least 70% and an 11 sample median survival of at least 90%. In layman's terms, this means that out of the last 11 samples only one bioassay may fall below 70% survival and the middle value when all 11 samples are placed in numerical order must be at least 90%.
- **Metals Analysis:** Our permit requires that we analyze our effluent for many different metals on a monthly basis. We have permit limits for some metals. The metals are stated as a daily max and a monthly average limit. The daily max limit is the number we cannot exceed on any sample and the monthly average applies to all samples collected in any month. (although usually we are only required to take one).
- **F.O.G. (Fats, oils and grease):** Quarterly we are required to monitor our effluent for Fats, Oils and Grease.

#### Glossary of terms continued...

- Headworks: The point where all raw wastewater enters the treatment plant. In this
  building wastewater goes through 3 grinders to grind up all large objects that could
  possibly damage our influent and sludge pumps further down the treatment process.
- **Primary Sedimentation:** The next treatment process is a physical treatment process where solids that settle or float are removed and sent to the digesters for further processing.
- Activated Sludge: Next is the activate sludge process. This process is a biological
  wastewater treatment process that uses microorganisms to speed up the
  decomposition of wastes. When activated sludge is added to wastewater, the
  microorganisms feed and grow on waste particles in the wastewater. As the organisms
  grow and reproduce, more and more waste is removed, leaving the wastewater partially
  cleaned. To function efficiently, the mass of organisms needs a steady balance of food
  and oxygen. These tasks are closely monitored by the operations staff.
- Secondary Clarification: Next is secondary clarification, like primary sedimentation/clarification, this also is a physical treatment process where solids that settle or float are removed and sent to the next treatment process. The difference between Secondary Clarification and primary sedimentation is that the solids removed from the secondary clarifiers goes to 2 places. Some goes to waste to the DAFT and some goes back to the activated sludge process for further treatment. (Microorganisms must be returned to the activated sludge process to keep an equal balance of food and microorganisms).
- **DAFT (dissolved air floatation thickener):** Next is the DAFT. The dissolved air floatation thickening process uses air bubbles to thicken WAS(waste active sludge) solids removed from the secondary clarifier, by floating solids to the tank surface, where they are removed and sent to the digesters for final processing.
- **Sludge Digestion:** In the anaerobic digestion process, all the organic material removed from the primary sedimentation tanks and DAFT's are digested by anaerobic bacteria. The end products are methane, carbon dioxide, water and neutralized organic matter.
- Solids Handling: This is the process where all the neutralized sludge from the digester is finally treated. Sludge from the digester is pumped to the screw press where it is conditioned with a polymer (chemical that reacts with the sludge to remove the water from the sludge and bind the sludge particles together) in order to dewater the sludge and produce a dry cake for final disposal to the Redwood landfill.

### Glossary of terms continued...

- **Disinfection:** This is the end point for the wastewater- at this point wastewater flows through the chlorine contact tank. This contact tank allows for enough contact time for chlorine solution to disinfect the wastewater. Sodium bisulfite is introduced at the end of the tank to neutralize any residual chlorine to protect the bay.
- MLSS (mixed liquor suspended solids): Suspended solids in the mixed liquor of an aeration tank measured in mg/l
- MCRT (mean cell resident time): An expression of the average time that a microorganism will spend in the activated sludge process.
- **SVI (sludge volume index):** This is a calculation used to indicate the settling ability of activated sludge in the secondary clarifier.
- RAS (return activated sludge): The purpose of returning activated sludge, is to maintain a sufficient concentration of activated sludge in the aeration tank.
- WAS (waste activated sludge): To maintain a stable process, the amount of solids added each day to the activated sludge process are removed as WAS. We track this by our MCRT which averages 3 days
- TWAS (thickened waste activated sludge): The WAS is thickened in the DAFT and the thickened sludge is then pumped to the digester.
- MPN (most probable number): Concentrations of total coliform bacteria are reported as the most probable number. The MPN is not the absolute count of the bacteria but a statistical estimate of their concentration.
- Bio-solids: Anaerobic digested sludge is pumped to a screw press where excess water is removed to reduce the volume (and weight) thus producing an end result called biosolids.
- **Polymer:** Organic polymers are added to digested sludge to bring out the formation of larger particles by bridging to improve processing.

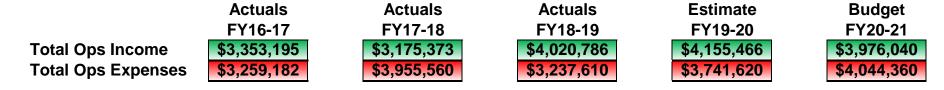

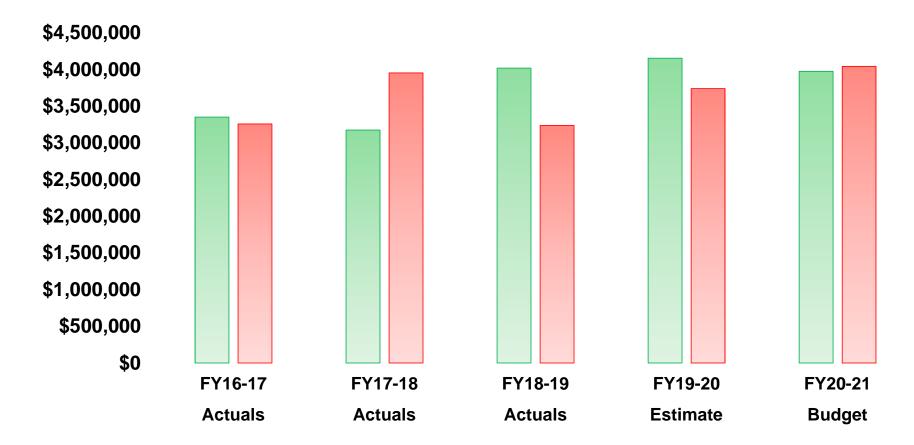

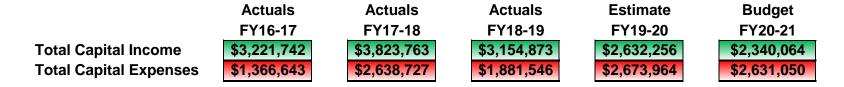


### **SD5 Five-Year Operating Comparison**

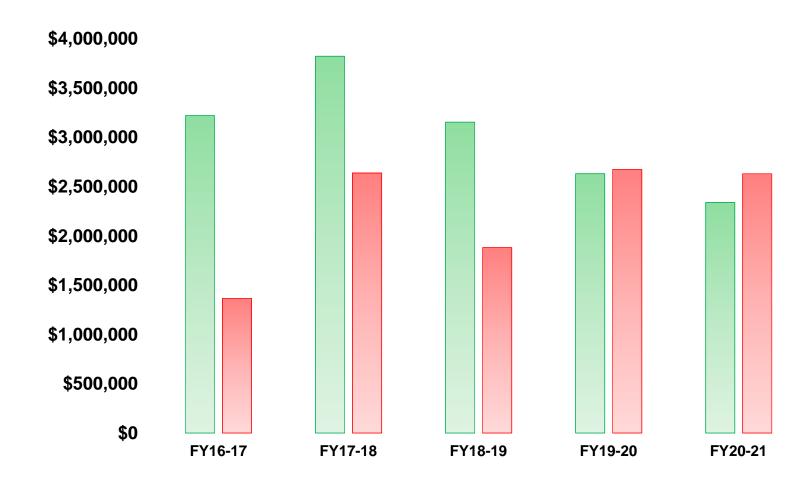


**Five-Year History: Capital Comparison**

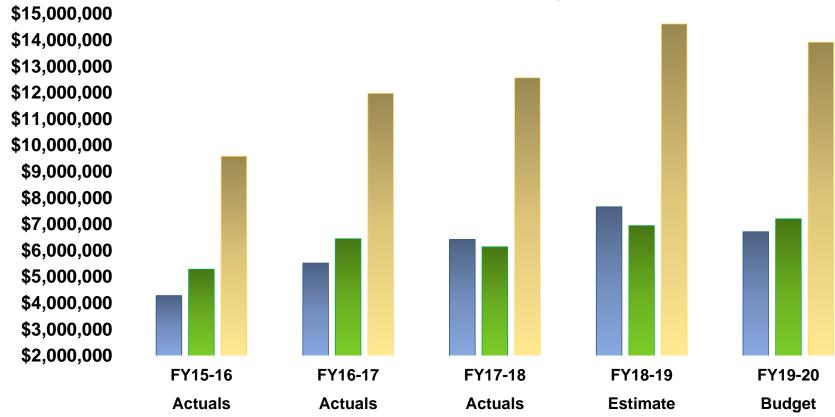

**Subject: Price Factor and Population Information** 

#### **Appropriations Limit**

California Revenue and Taxation Code section 2227 requires the Department of Finance to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction must use their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2020, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2020-21. Attachment A provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2020-21 appropriations limit. Attachment B provides the city and unincorporated county population percentage change. Attachment C provides the population percentage change for counties and their summed incorporated areas. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations.

#### **Population Percent Change for Special Districts**

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. California Revenue and Taxation Code section 2228 provides additional information regarding the appropriations limit. Article XIII B, section 9(C) of the California Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. The code section and the California Constitution can be accessed at the following website: <a href="http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/codes.xhtml">http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/codes.xhtml</a>.

Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. Any questions special districts have on this requirement should be directed to their county, district legal counsel, or the law itself. No state agency reviews the local appropriations limits.

#### **Population Certification**

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. California Revenue and Taxation Code section 11005.6 mandates Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. **Finance will certify the higher estimate to the State Controller by June 1, 2020**.

**Please Note**: The prior year's city population estimates may be revised. The per capita personal income change is based on historical data. Given the stay-at-home orders due to COVID-19, growth in the coming years may be substantially lower than recent trends.

A. **Price Factor**: Article XIII B specifies that local jurisdictions select their cost of living factor to compute their appropriation limit by a vote of their governing body. The cost of living factor provided here is per capita personal income. If the percentage change in per capita personal income is selected, the percentage change to be used in setting the fiscal year 2020-21 appropriation limit is:

#### **CHAPTER 5**

#### GOVERNMENT APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT: ARTICLE XIIIB OF THE CALIFORNIA CONSTITUTION

#### 1. IN BRIEF: WHAT IS THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT?

Proposition 4 approved by the voters in November 1979 added California Constitution, Article XIIIB. Article XIIIB limits the level of most appropriations from tax sources that the state and most local government entities are permitted to make in any given year. The limit for each year is equal to the limit for the prior year, adjusted for changes in the cost-of-living and population. Various other adjustments are also required. The first year in which appropriations limits applied to state and local governments in California was fiscal year (FY) 1980-81.

Article XIIIB also requires state and local governments to return to taxpayers (or in certain cases, K-14 education programs) any tax revenues in excess of the amount that can be appropriated in any given FY.

This constitutional provision also contains requirements that the state reimburse local governments and school districts for the costs of complying with state mandates, and requires the Legislature to establish a prudent state reserve fund.

Article XIIIB was significantly modified by two initiative constitutional amendments approved by the state's voters in November 1988, Propositions 98 and 99. Proposition 111, approved by the voters in June 1990, made several additional significant revisions in the appropriations limit. Changes made by these propositions are noted in the following sections.

#### 2. EXPENDITURES VERSUS APPROPRIATIONS

The terms "appropriations limit" and "spending limit" or "expenditure limit" are often used interchangeably, and there is some confusion about the difference between appropriations and expenditures.

An appropriation is an action by the Legislature to set aside an amount of money for a specified purpose. In short, an appropriation authorizes money to be spent. Appropriations are made in the annual Budget Bill, or in individual bills providing for specific governmental programs.

The actual expenditure of money occurs later, and is implemented by the State Controller. Writing checks is a ministerial function of the Controller. The Controller has no authority to expend money that has not been appropriated by the Legislature.

The amount of an expenditure on a program may not equal the appropriation for that program. For example, if the number of clients for a particular government service is actually less than anticipated, the appropriation may be larger than the amount actually spent.

Article XIIIB sets forth a limit on the amounts that may be appropriated from government proceeds of taxes. In the remainder of this chapter, Article XIIIB will be referred to as an appropriations limit, although in casual conversation and popular press it is often called a spending limit.

#### 3. HOW THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT WORKS

Most of the operative provisions of Article XIIIB are provided in the Constitution. Some features required statutory implementation, which was accomplished by legislation enacted in 1980, and again in 1990 for changes made by Proposition 111.

The paragraphs below describe how the appropriations limit works, based on both constitutional and statutory provisions. Opinions provided by the Legislative Counsel and the Attorney General have contributed to our interpretation of the provisions of Article XIIIB.

Which Governmental Agencies Have Limits. Article XIIIB applies to the state and to most units of local government -- cities, counties, K-12 school districts, community college districts, and special districts. Each governmental entity has its own appropriations limit. The few local governmental entities that are not subject to an appropriations limit are:

- Special districts in existence on January 1, 1987 that did not levy a property tax rate in excess of 12.5% in FY 1977-78; and
- New special districts formed since that time by a vote of the people that are not funded from proceeds of taxes.

Which Revenues Are Subject to Limit. Article XIIIB places a limit on appropriations from most, but not all, government revenue sources. The limit applies to appropriations from proceeds of taxes from both the general fund and special funds of government entities. Proceeds of taxes include tax revenues, interest earnings on invested tax revenues, and any revenues collected by a regulatory license fee or user charge in excess of the amount needed to cover the cost of providing the regulation, product, or service.

Appropriations from non-tax revenues are excluded from the limit. Examples of non-tax proceeds include lottery proceeds, tidelands oil revenues, federal funds, proceeds from the sale of government property, revenues from regulatory license fees or user charges equal to the amount needed to cover the cost of providing the function, gifts, and borrowed funds.

Proposition 111 excluded appropriations from the following revenue sources from the limit:

- ° Gas and diesel tax revenues above nine cents per gallon;
- Sales and use taxes collected on gas and diesel taxes above nine cents per gallon; and
- ° Truck weight fees that exceed those in effect on January 1, 1990.

Which Appropriations Are Subject to Limit. Appropriations for almost all government functions are subject to limitation under Article XIIIB. However, there are some important exceptions.

The original Proposition 4 provided that the following appropriations are not limited, even if made from proceeds of taxes:

- Subventions from the state to local governments and schools, the use of which is unrestricted (these subventions are not subject to the state's limit, but instead are counted as subject to the local entity's limit);
- Appropriations to pay for costs of complying with federal laws and court mandates;

- Payments for interest and redemption charges on pre-existing (i.e., pre-Proposition 4) or voter-approved bonded indebtedness;
- ° Withdrawals from previously appropriated reserve funds; and
- ° Refunds of taxes.

Proposition 99, adopted by the voters in November 1988, created another major category of appropriations not subject to the limit. These are appropriations of new tax moneys from cigarette and tobacco products resulting from tax increases imposed by Proposition 99. Under that statutory initiative, beginning in FY 1988-89, state revenues from those new or increased cigarette and tobacco taxes are set aside in special accounts for expenditure on treatment or research of tobacco-related diseases, tobacco health education programs, and wildlife preservation and related programs. All such appropriations are exempt from limitation under Article XIIIB.

Proposition 111 excluded capital outlay from the appropriations limit. This change reflects the fact that while capital outlay appropriations are made during a single budget year, they reflect long-term investments that are utilized over a number of years.

Appropriations directly related to an emergency, such as a fire, earthquake, or other natural disaster, were also excluded from the limit by Proposition 111. No reduction in future limits is required for appropriations made for these emergency purposes.

**The "Base Year" Limit.** The first year that limits were in effect was FY 1980-81. The base year for determining the appropriations limit in FY 1980-81 was FY 1978-79. Actual appropriations in the FY 1978-79 fiscal year that had been financed by the proceeds of taxes were the starting point. Appropriations not subject to limitation (see above) were subtracted from that figure and this became the "base year" level of appropriations for computing all subsequent years' limits.

Proposition 111 updated the base year for calculating the limit for each government entity to FY 1986-87. For fiscal years beginning with FY 1990-91, the limit for each entity is the FY 1986-87 limit adjusted annually as specified by Article XIIIB as amended by Proposition 111.

Base year appropriations limits for new local government entities incorporated after the enactment of Article XIIIB are to be established by local agency formation commissions or county formation review commissions, and approved by the voters of the incorporation or formation elections.

**Annual Adjustments to the Limit**. The appropriations limit for each year since FY 1980-81 is calculated by adjusting the base year limit for changes in the cost-of-living

and population. Proposition 111, passed by the voters in June 1990, revised each of the adjustment factors. Specifically, annual adjustments to limits, either upward or downward, are made as follows:

#### Cost-of-Living.

**State and schools**. Governments' limits are adjusted by the change in California per capita personal income.

**Local agencies (except schools)**. Limits are adjusted by the change in California per capita personal income or the change in the local property tax roll due to the addition of new nonresidential construction.

#### ° Population.

**State**. The population factor is calculated by adding: (a) the change in the state's total population weighted by the percent of the budget spent on non-educational programs, and (b) the change in average daily attendance (ADA) for K-14 education weighted by the percentage of the budget spent on K-14 education.

**Local agencies**. The population factor is the percentage change in the jurisdiction or in the county in which the jurisdiction is located. Special districts located in two or more counties may use the change in the county in which the district has the highest assessed valuation.

**Counties**. The population change for counties can be calculated by using one of three methods: (a) the percentage change in population within the county; (b) the percentage change in population for both the county itself and contiguous counties; or (c) the percentage change in population within the incorporated portion of the county.

**K-14 Schools**. The change in population is the percentage change in average daily attendance.

- Program Transfers. Limits of governmental entities are modified to reflect transfers of financial responsibility from one level of government to another. The limit of the new service provider is increased by the amount the former service provider's limit is reduced.
- Eunding Transfers. Adjustments either upward or downward are made to account for transfers of program funding sources, for example from tax revenues (subject to limit) to fees (not subject to limit).

The level of appropriations actually made by a government entity in any year does not have any bearing on the calculation of the appropriations limit for the subsequent years. Each year's limit is computed based on the prior year's limit, not the prior year's appropriations.

If the governing body actually appropriates less money than what would be permitted by the limit, it has "room" under its limit, and the limit will be further adjusted the following year for cost-of-living and population changes. A government entity does not "lose" room under its limit for the future by appropriating less than the maximum permitted in any year.

**Appropriations Permitted in Excess of the Limit**. Article XIIIB sets forth two circumstances under which governments may make appropriations in excess of their limits:

- <sup>o</sup> <u>Emergency</u>. Appropriations for declared emergencies do not count towards and may be made in excess of the limit. Proposition 111 removed the requirement that the limits for future years must be reduced over a three-year period so that there would be no total increase in allowable appropriations.
- Oter Approval. Article XIIIB permits voters of a jurisdiction to authorize an increase in the appropriations limit. However, no voter-approved increase may be in effect for more than four years. At the end of the four-year period, either the voters must approve another increase or the limit must return to the level it would otherwise have been.

When Revenues Exceed the Appropriations Limit. A government entity may receive revenues during a fiscal year that exceed its appropriations limit. Proposition 111 allows governments to average appropriations over a two year period before becoming subject to the excess revenue provisions of Article XIIIB. In other words, a government entity can offset appropriations that exceeds its appropriations limit in one year of a two-year period by appropriating less than the limit in the other year. If revenues exceed the appropriations limit after taking this two-year averaging into account and authority to appropriate is not provided by either an emergency declaration or voter approval, Article XIIIB as amended by Propositions 98 and 111 sets forth a process for disposing of the excess state revenues:

Education Programs. After the two-year averaging period, 50% of any excess revenues are transferred to the State School Fund for elementary, secondary and community college education. A portion of this excess revenue (25%) may effectively be built into the base used to calculate future funding required by Proposition 98 if the excess funds are used for a specified purpose. The transfer to education is not required if the state's average expenditure per student and average class size is equal to or exceeds that of the ten states with

the best performance in these areas.

Return of Excess. The 50% of excess revenues remaining after the transfer to education must be returned to taxpayers within the following two years. The return can be made through a reduction in the tax rate or as a fee reduction.

#### 4. HISTORY OF THE STATE'S LIMIT, FYs 1980-81 TO 2006-07

**How the Limit is Administered**. Under statute, the Governor must submit to the Legislature along with the budget an estimate of the state's appropriations limit for the budget year. The estimate is subject to the budget process, and the official limit is established in the annual Budget Bill. The Department of Finance and the Legislative Analyst's Office have developed the methodologies necessary to compute the limit annually.

Effect of the State's Limit FYs 1980-81 to 1986-87. For the first five years that Article XIIIB was operative, it essentially had no constraining effect on state budgets. Changes in population and CPI outpaced the growth in state revenue in the early 1980s, so that actual revenues received were the constraint on the level of state spending until FY 1986-87.

During this period unused "room" under the state's appropriations limit peaked in FY 1982-83 at \$3.4 billion, and declined steadily after that. A decline in the rate of inflation after that time reduced the rate at which the limit was raised annually, while at the same time a robust economy brought steady growth in state revenues. In late 1986, analysts were predicting that by FY 1987-88, the Article XIIIB appropriations limit would begin to function as a significant constraint on state spending.

However, an unanticipated surge in tax revenues in the spring of 1987 caught most observers by surprise. That revenue surge, caused primarily by taxpayer reaction to the federal Tax Reform Act of 1986, pushed the state substantially over its appropriations limit for the first time during the 1986-87 fiscal year. The state ended that fiscal year with \$1.1 billion in excess revenues.

**FY 1986-87 Rebate of Excess Revenues**. During FY 1986-87 Article XIIIB required excess revenues to be returned by means of a tax rate reduction or fee reduction. The method selected to deal with the \$1.1 billion in excess state revenues for the 1986-87 FY was to send rebate checks to 11.1 million personal income taxpayers.

**The Limit Today**. Revisions to the limit calculation implemented by Proposition 111 have continued to result in room under the appropriations limit since 1986. For example, California is expected to be almost \$12 billion under the appropriations cap in FY 2007-08.

# 5. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE STATE'S AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' LIMITS

**Subventions**. As noted above, subventions from the state to local governments that are unrestricted as to the purposes for which they may be spent are not counted as state expenditures subject to limit, but rather are counted against the local limit.

With respect to K-12 school districts, a portion of a district's revenue limit apportionment from the state constitutes a subvention for purposes of Article XIIIB. Subventions are defined as amounts necessary to fund the "foundation program," after taking into account local tax revenues. The "foundation program" represents a computed value that generally is less than the revenue limit amount. The balance of the regular apportionment, as well as apportionments for categorical programs, are not considered to be subventions. State subventions for community college districts are determined similarly.

**Reporting Requirements**. Legislation enacted in 1987 requires local entities to include information in their annual budget documents relating to their appropriations limits and their appropriations subject to the limit. Proposition 111 requires that the annual calculation of a local government entity's appropriations limit shall be part of that entity's annual financial audit.

Consideration of Award of Construction Contract to Glosage Engineering Inc for the Cove Road Force Main Replacement Project

#### **STAFF REPORT:**

The 2020 Cove Road PS Force Main Project consists of the installation of a new approximately 2142 linear feet of HDPE sixteen-inch outside diameter force sewer main located in the Town of Tiburon and the City of Belvedere under the base bid. The pipe will be installed through open cut method for the new 16" HDPE sewer force main. Also as part of this project is the installation of a 2<sup>nd</sup> connection from Tiburon Pump station #6. This line is a 152 linear foot 6.625" Outside diameter HDPE sewer force main. The notice inviting bids was advertised in April 30, 2020, and bids were opened on May 19, 2020 at 1pm. Actual construction is planned to begin in July 2020, prior to the wet weather season. The engineer's cost estimate for the project was \$1,902,385 for the base bid of 2,142 linear ft of new pipe installation.

In 2016, when the District began the research phase of this project it was roughly estimated that the project cost would be around \$1,000,000. This was before uncovering CalTrans' right-of-way requirements.

CalTrans' right-of-way requirements are estimated at \$402,200 for this project.

On May 19, 2020, the District opened bids for the 2020 Cove Road PS Force Main Project. The Bid results are presented as follows:

The low bid is above the engineer's estimate of \$1,902,385, which was estimated based on historic bid results and current costs of pipe material. Maggiora Ghilotti Inc. bid results may reflect current market conditions and based on the engineer's review of recent Public Works' project bid results. The engineer has recommended award of the contract.

There was a total of 10 contractors that attended the mandatory pre bid meeting two weeks ago, of those 10, 5 submitted bids.

The estimated financial break down below per respective zone will based off of historical flows and capacity of both stations as was identified in our 2016 design work. Tiburon will share in 39% of the cost for the shared 1300 linear ft of force main pipe (connection point- to discharge point)

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Direct Tiburon Costs: \$249,800

Direct Belvedere Costs: \$734,625

Shared Tiburon Costs: \$390,081

Shared Belvedere Costs: \$597,465

Total Estimated Tiburon \$639,881

Total Estimated Belvedere \$1,332,090

Please note that there is a CDF Alternate bid item for \$270,000. This item was included in the event we are required to use CDF for backfill as part of the project. The town has confirmed we do not have to use this in Tiburon as we will have Miller Pacific Performing compaction testing. If the City of Belvedere requires us to use CDF for this project there will a portion of the alternate bid item that will be charged directly to our Belvedere account.

The current projected budget had allocated \$1,900,000 for this project based off the Districts 2016 assessment and project design proposal. An additional \$100,000 will be required to proceed with this project. Both Zones have sufficient Capital Reserves. Currently the Belvedere Capital account is at \$2,425,00 and the Tiburon Capital account is at \$4,253,000.

Dear Tony:

As requested Nute Engineering is pleased to submit the following proposal for the construction management services for the Cove Road Force Main Replacement.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The existing Cove Road force main serves almost all of the City of Belvedere service area of Sanitary District No. 5. This existing force main is 10" diameter asbestos cement pipe (ACP), 2,107 feet long running form Belvedere Pump Station No. 1 on Cove Road to a manhole on Tiburon Blvd at Main Street. Belvedere Pump Station No. 1 was originally constructed in 1961 and reconfigured in 1981 with two dry weather submersible pumps and two wet weather pumps to accommodate both dry and wet weather flows. However, during peak wet weather flows, the pump station falls behind due to capacity limitations of the existing force main.

District staff has had concerns about the condition of the ACP force main pipe because it is over 50 years old. ACP pipe has been known to soften on the top, particularly when air is trapped in the line. The ACP pipeline has failed and been fixed twice. A new force main would provide additional service life and potentially more capacity, which would improve overall reliability.

Nute Engineering has prepared plans for constructing a parallel, and larger capacity Cove Road Pump Station force main and the project is currently out to bid.

The Beach Road Pump Station force main runs along Tiburon Blvd and discharges into the same manhole as does the Cove Road force main. In order to provide backup and redundancy for Beach Road Pump Station, a new 6 inch force main will be constructed to connect to the new Cove Road Pump Station force main.

This project is to be constructed within three road jurisdictions for different segments of the force main: City of Belvedere, Town of Tiburon and the Caltrans right of way for Highway 131 (Tiburon Blvd). Nute Engineering has worked closely with the District and representatives of these Districts to inform them of the impending project and to obtain encroachment permits or permit conditions as necessary.

#### SCOPE OF WORK

Nute Engineering construction management personnel will team with Willis Land Surveyors for project layout and elevation grade checks within the three jurisdictions this project crosses. Miller Pacific Engineering Group, Geotechnical Engineers of Novato, CA, will provide project backfill compaction testing in the field and CDF backfill lab testing, plus a final report to right of way jurisdictions.

For the Engineering Services During Construction, Nute Engineering will provide the typical review of the contractor's requests for information, material submittals review and changed condition claims and manage contractor construction meetings with the District Staff.

For the optional Construction Observation Services, Nute Engineering has arranged to have Karen Chew, PE, for the on-site construction observation. Karen recently retired from San Rafael Sanitation District construction management staff and has had many years of experience working on underground pipeline projects in San Rafael. She is a licensed engineer, and particularly good at working as an interface with the public, businesses, other utilities and other agencies during construction projects. These skills will be effective in the day-to-day management of the contractors work and activities.

#### **Schedule A Services – Engineering Services During Construction**

The construction management services for the improvements to the Cove Road Pumps Station force main will consist of the following items of work:

- 1. Prepare agenda and attend preconstruction meeting.
- 2. Provide construction staking for new sewer force main on Cove Road, Beach Road, Juanita Lane and Tiburon Blvd (Hwy 131).
- 3. Prepare agendas and facilitate bi-weekly construction meetings (assume 6 meetings).
- 4. Review and respond to contractor's requests for information.
- 5. Review contractor's Caltrans submittals and assist with Caltrans coordination.
- 6. Review contractor's submittals and working drawings as necessary.
- 7. Provide consultations with the District regarding construction issues as necessary.

- 8. Geotechnical testing services (compaction and CDF testing)
- 9. Evaluate proposals for modifications to contract work and prepare change orders for District's approval.
- 10. Review and prepare monthly progress billings.
- 11. Provide engineering oversight during final force main testing.
- 12. Prepare a set of record drawings for the project.

#### Schedule B Services – (Optional) On site Construction Observer Services

Provide a construction observer 4 hours per day for the contract period :

- Construction observation hours assumes that the observer will be on-site for 4 hours per word day for the 90 calendar day project (65 estimated working days, 30 minute back and forth drive time) the Project Manager on-site 5 hours per week.
- The construction observer is familiar with direct burial construction materials, and methods of construction.
- During the construction day the observer will monitor daily activities and track progress.
- During the construction day the observer will monitor the Contractor Safety Practices, and bring unsafe conditions to the attention of the District.
- During the construction day the observer will monitor the Contractors environmental practices including dust control and control and treatment of any surface water or ground water generated on the construction site.
- During the construction day the observer will monitor the contractor's compliance with the Caltrans Encroachment Permit, the Town of Tiburon Encroachment Permit and the City of Belvedere Encroachment Permit.
- Finally the construction observer will handle the daily issues which may arise with the public and members of the business community.

#### SERVICES NOT INCLUDED IN THIS PROPOSAL

It is understood that the following services are outside the scope of this proposal and can be provided by Nute Engineering or by others as deemed necessary:

- 1. Potholing of underground utilities.
- 2. Investigation of potential hazardous wastes in the soil or groundwater.
- 3. Environmental review or preparation of an environmental impact report of the project.
- 4. Necessary permit applications and application fees.
- 5. Legal services in connection with the project.
- 6. Title searches and appraisals.
- 7. Acquisition of rights of ways, rights of entries or construction permits.
- 8. On site construction observation services unless specifically authorized in the optional construction observation services (see above).

We propose to do all the work on a time and materials basis to be billed according to the Schedule of Hourly Rates attached hereto as Attachment A. 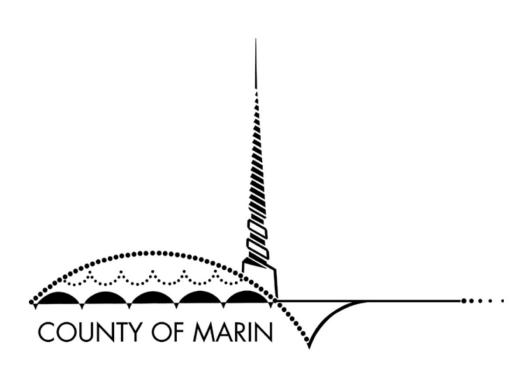

# A Note about the Coronavirus Pandemic

The 2019–2020 Marin County Civil Grand Jury is issuing its reports during the unprecedented conditions of the COVID-19 pandemic. We are well aware that Marin County is in crisis and that critical public health concerns, operational difficulties, and financial challenges throughout the county have a greater claim to government attention right now than the important issues raised by this Grand Jury.

We are confident that, in due course, Marin will come through this crisis as strong as ever.



# Follow-Up Report on Web Transparency of Agency Compensation Practices

# **Summary**

Many Marin public agencies fail to make the compensation for their elected officials and employees fully transparent on their public websites, despite state legal requirements and past Grand Jury recommendations that they do so. The 2019–2020 Grand Jury examined the current status of 34 Marin public agency websites to determine if they are meeting transparency standards with respect to compensation disclosures.

California law requires most public agencies to report the annual compensation of their "elected officials, officers, and employees" to the state controller's office, which posts this information on its Government Compensation in California website at *publicpay.ca.gov* (Public Pay). Each local agency with a website also is legally required to post "in a conspicuous location . . . information on the annual compensation of its elected officials, officers and employees."

All of Marin's cities, towns, and major agencies have websites, so each of them is required to post annual compensation data, and the public should be able to easily find this information.

Over and above these basic legal requirements, the public has an interest in understanding compensation policies with regard to elected officials, including information about wages, health and retirement benefits, and reimbursement policies. There is a wide variance in compensation policies and the total amounts and benefits paid to elected officials. The public should be able to access this information easily and quickly rather than having to dig through meeting minutes or policy manuals that may or may not be easy to find on a website.

The 34 agency websites audited included those of the County of Marin, Marin's 11 cities and towns, 10 sanitary districts, 9 fire districts, and 3 water districts. The Grand Jury wanted to know if the legal disclosure requirements were met and if detailed information about compensation and benefits for elected officials was readily available.

This investigation revealed that a great majority of audited agency websites failed to comply fully with legal compensation disclosure requirements. Compensation information was often difficult to find and outdated. Information on actual compensation paid to elected officials was also missing, difficult to find, or insufficient. In many cases, it was difficult to find information about compensation policies for elected officials. In contrast, the Marin Municipal Water

District<sup>3</sup> (MMWD) and the North Marin Water District<sup>4</sup> each annually post a detailed report on the compensation of their elected officials.

This Grand Jury report makes specific recommendations for every agency to follow to ensure compliance with legal requirements and to go beyond compliance to achieve higher standards of public transparency.

# **Background**

The transparency of public agencies and their compensation policies has been an ongoing topic of state and local concern. In recent years, the state legislature amended the California Government Code to require the posting of annual compensation data on agency websites.<sup>5</sup> Local agencies are now required to report their compensation data to the state controller's office, which posts the data on the Public Pay site.<sup>6</sup>

Since 2014, the Marin County Civil Grand Jury has published four reports on web transparency:

- A 2013–2014 Grand Jury report, *What Are Special Districts and Why Do They Matter?*, recommended that the county post a complete list of all of Marin's special districts on its website to enable residents to understand the extent of local government.<sup>7</sup> The county did not fulfill this recommended action.
- In March 2016, the 2015–2016 Grand Jury followed up with its *Web Transparency Report Card*, reiterating, among other things, that the master list of special districts should be completed. It also recommended that all agencies should update their websites "to include the annual compensation of . . . elected officials, officers and employees." These recommended actions were not completed.
- The 2016–2017 Grand Jury issued its *Web Transparency Report Card Update*, which noted a marked improvement in the quality of agency websites. This report card also noted additional room for improvement for many agencies.<sup>10</sup>

■ In a report entitled *Special Districts Transparency Update*, the 2018–2019 Grand Jury noted that the special districts list recommended by the 2013–2014 Grand Jury still had not been created. The report reiterated this recommendation and suggested that the special district list include "complete compensation components and amounts (including salary, insurance, stipends, in kind goods, conference fees and other benefits, and reimbursements)." 12

The Grand Jury has focused on these issues for more than six years, without satisfactory resolution. Perhaps with this follow-up report, agencies will come to understand the vital importance of public transparency and will be more forthcoming with this information and finally improve their websites. Public transparency regarding compensation of elected officials is essential because the public needs accurate information about its government agencies. Transparency helps to maintain trust in the government and gives information to the public that helps guide decisions on matters of self-governance. It makes responsive democracy work.

# **Approach**

The Grand Jury reviewed the work of prior juries as published in the four previous reports and audited the websites of 34 of Marin's public agencies, including the County of Marin, Marin's 11 cities and towns, 10 sanitary districts, 9 fire districts, and 3 water districts (this report uses the term "agency" to refer to these diverse jurisdictions). Jurors reviewed these websites to determine if they met the legal requirements by providing easy access to accurate, current compensation data for public employees. Jurors also checked the board or council pages of these websites to determine if they included detail about annual compensation for elected officials.

The audit was conducted by having at least one juror review each agency's website and compile a list of any deficiencies. This work was then reviewed by at least two other jurors. Those three jurors then reached a consensus for each agency. These agency website reviews were valid as of February 20, 2020.

# **Discussion**

# The Public Should Know the Compensation of Its Elected Officials

The taxpaying public has a right to know the compensation of its elected officials. Compensation may include the following:

- Monthly wages or a fixed stipend per meeting attended
- Additional compensation for sitting on affiliated boards, subcommittees, or commissions, or for attending extra meetings on behalf of their agency

- Healthcare benefits
- Retirement benefits
- Reimbursement for travel, attending conferences, or industry events
- Reimbursement for cell phones, computers, or tablets (or free use of such equipment)

The public should be informed that there is a wide variance in compensation policies. Some agencies have adopted a policy not to compensate their elected officials. In addition, total compensation and benefits paid to elected officials for similar agencies varies. The high and low ranges for compensation at various types of agencies are summarized in Table 1. In some cases, elected officials waive their right to some or all compensation.

# **County Supervisors**

Unlike elected officials in most cities, towns, and other agencies, Marin County supervisors are full-time employees and receive full-time salaries and benefits. Total 2018 annual compensation for members of the Marin County Board of Supervisors ranged from \$173,000 to \$186,000, plus benefits.

# City and Town Council Members

For town and city councilmembers, total annual compensation for 2018 ranged from zero in Belvedere,

Ross, and Tiburon to about \$17,000 in San Rafael. Annual compensation was typically in the \$3,000 to \$5,000 range, and councilmembers in some municipalities, including San Rafael, elected to waive compensation.

#### **Fire District Board Members**

Total 2018 compensation for individual board members in Marin's nine audited fire districts ranged from zero to \$2,800. Board members in the Bolinas, Sleepy Hollow, Southern Marin, and Stinson Beach Fire Protection Districts do not receive compensation. In the Novato Fire Protection District, 2018 compensation for one board member was about \$2,800. The Central Marin Fire Authority was formed in 2018 and, as of February 1, 2020, had not yet filed its first compensation data with the state controller, but the agency is included in this report so that it will fulfill the requirement that it post its compensation data.

#### **Sanitation District Board Members**

In Marin's 10 sanitation districts, 2018 total annual board member compensation ranged from zero in the Tiburon and Central Marin Sanitation Districts to as high as \$19,000 in the Las Gallinas Valley Sanitary District. Typically, annual board member compensation in Marin's sanitation districts ranges from \$1,000 to \$4,000.

#### **Water District Board Members**

The 2018 annual board member compensation in Marin's three water districts ranged from \$1,600 in the Stinson Beach Water District to \$9,000 in the North Marin Water District to \$39,000 in the Marin Municipal Water District.

# **Legal Requirements Regarding Compensation Disclosures**

There are two sections in the California Government Code requiring compensation disclosures. Section 53892 requires that most public agencies (school districts are excluded) report annually to the state controller the total compensation of all "elected officials, officers and employees." The state controller publishes this information for all agencies on the Public Pay website.

Section 53908 requires that if an agency has a website "it shall post, in a conspicuous location on its Internet Web site, information on the annual compensation of its elected officials, officers, and employees that is submitted to the controller." An agency could comply with this provision by posting a complete table on its website that includes all of the data actually filed with the state controller, and by updating that table each year. Section 53908 also allows an agency to comply with the transparency requirement by posting, "in a conspicuous location on its Internet Web site, a link to" the Public Pay site. <sup>14</sup>

The Grand Jury also notes that Section 53908 mentions *twice* that the Public Pay link must be "conspicuous," a term that is not defined in the code. For purposes of its investigation, the Grand Jury decided that a link could be deemed conspicuous if it satisfies *both* of the following criteria:

- The link is located on a page that is within three clicks of the website's home page (where a hover causing a menu to be revealed is equivalent to a click).
- The link can be found within five minutes of starting a search, whether by browsing menus or using a search box on the website.

This is a commonsense approach that, if anything, is generous to agencies, since internet users are unlikely to invest as much as five minutes in such a search.

The Grand Jury also determined that a Public Pay link that does not go directly to the agency's page on the Public Pay site for the most recently available year should not be considered compliant with the intent of the transparency requirements set forth in the law.

During its investigation, the Grand Jury discovered that some agencies were not reporting board member compensation to the state controller's office because they had been advised by the state controller's office that this was not required unless a W-2 form for the compensation was issued. Some elected officials are paid fees for which W-2 forms are not issued. State officials have now confirmed that the elected officials' compensation must be reported regardless of how they are paid.

# **Public Transparency of Compensation for Elected Officials**

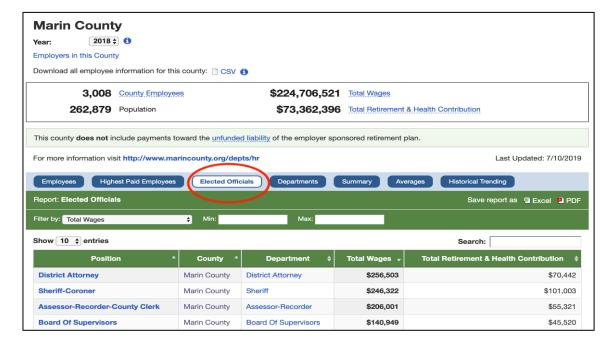


Figure 1. Public Pay Elected Officials Page Example

Beyond the basic legal requirements in California state law, public transparency goals would be better served by stronger disclosure of compensation policies and detailed compensation paid to elected officials. While total compensation paid to elected officials can be found by clicking an "Elected Officials" button on the agency's page on the Public Pay site, as shown in Figure 1, most users would not necessarily see this link and might need to scroll through multiple pages of employees before finding the elected officials.

To make locating the information easier, a link can be included directly from the agency's website to the elected officials data on the Public Pay site. This can be done by simply adding &rpt=5 to the end of a regular Public Pay URL link.

The data on the Public Pay site for elected officials is limited to total wages and total retirement and health contributions. The site does not break out elements such as per-meeting stipends, reimbursements or payments for serving as an agency liaison to other advisory committees, councils, and forums. For better transparency on their websites, local agencies should disclose all elements of compensation for their elected officials and establish this higher standard as best practice for all of Marin County.

Both MMWD and the North Marin Water District have excellent practices with regard to transparency on compensation of their elected officials. The MMWD website's board page provides a quick link to an annual compensation report detailing board compensation policies

and annual amounts paid to each member for regular board meetings, board committees, other special board meetings, and liaison assignments to advisory committees, councils, and forums. It also details total annual payments for conferences, training, and memberships, as well as medical and dental benefits and other benefits, including iPad data plans. North Marin Water District discloses several annual board compensation elements by a direct link to the financial report it files with the state controller's office, but it is not as detailed as the MMWD report.

#### Results of the Website Audit

The Grand Jury audit found that many website compensation links were missing or broken. In other cases, links were not easy to find. Policies and compensation for elected officials were not always posted. Thirty of the 34 audited agency websites failed to comply fully with legal disclosure requirements.

#### Missing or Inconspicuous Links

Fifteen of 34 of the audited agency websites failed to post a compensation report or a "conspicuous" link to their data on the Public Pay site. These agencies are shown in Table 2. The worst example of this was the County of Marin's website, where four jurors were each unable to locate a compensation link after searching for at least 15 minutes.

In the investigation, the Grand Jury observed that several agencies post a link to the Transparent California website rather than to the Public Pay website.<sup>15</sup> Transparent California is not included in Government Code Section 53908, so this does not comply with the legal requirements.

The Grand Jury recommends that all the noncompliant agencies identified in Table 2 remedy these deficiencies by placing a Public Pay link on the web page listed in the table. Generally, the audit revealed that the best location for a Public Pay link is either the finance or human resources section of the agency's website.

#### Link Does Not Go Directly to the Agency's Most Recent Data

Many agencies include a Public Pay link on their website that is deficient because it connects the user to an outdated page or to the state's Public Pay home page rather than directly to the local agency data on the Public Pay site. The Grand Jury believes this is largely due to a technical oversight.

Appendix A contains the recommended Public Pay link for each audited agency, as well as links for 22 additional agencies that were not audited. A key feature of these links is that they include the ID number of the agency, but exclude any parameter specifying a year (an example of this parameter is &year=2016). By excluding the specific year parameter, the link will automatically lead a user to the most recent available data for that agency, and it will not become outdated over time. This will save the agency the work of updating the link on an annual basis while reducing the chance of errors in future postings.

### Agency Websites Should Have a Link Directly to Elected Officials Data

Although it is simple to link directly to a page on the Public Pay website showing actual compensation paid to elected officials, none of the audited agencies currently do so. All Marin public agency websites should have a direct link from their board or council page to their "Elected Officials" page on the Public Pay site. All Marin agencies should adopt this higher standard of transparency.

A link to the "Elected Officials" page on the Public Pay site can be added simply by adding a new parameter to the end of the normal Public Pay link as is shown for all agencies in Appendix A. For instance, the City of San Rafael could include such a link by adding &rpt=5 to

the end of its Public Pay link, resulting in the following: https://publicpay.ca.gov/Reports/Cities/City.aspx?entityid=256&rpt=5.

#### Agencies Should Post Compensation Policies and Annual Compensation Details

The Grand Jury audit revealed that compensation policies for many agencies either were not posted or were scattered in a wide variety of hard-to-find locations. Eighteen of the 34 agencies did not post such information on the board or council pages of their websites. As described previously, public transparency is promoted by posting detailed information about the compensation policies for elected officials. All agencies should post this information on their board or council web pages. As an example, MMWD posts detailed information about the annual compensation of its elected officials. All Marin agencies should adopt this higher standard of transparency.

#### Conclusion

To make informed decisions on matters of self-governance, the public needs to understand the workings of their public agencies, including the compensation of elected officials. Public transparency helps to maintain trust in the government. It makes responsive democracy work.

By following the recommendations in this report, Marin's public agency websites can come into compliance with state legal requirements. Following these recommendations will reduce the chance of errors and minimize the time needed to keep websites current. These changes also will improve public access to important information while increasing the transparency that is essential to good government in a democratic society.

# **Findings**

- F1. Many Marin public agencies fail to include on their websites either a link to the *publicpay.ca.gov* site showing compensation for their elected officials, officers, and employees, or a table showing such data. The Grand Jury determined that these agencies fail to comply with the requirements of Government Code Section 53908.
- F2. Any link to compensation data on an agency's website that takes more than five minutes or three clicks from the home page to locate, does not reasonably satisfy the intent of the Government Code that the information be easily located and "conspicuous" on the agency's website.
- F3. Any link to *publicpay.ca.gov* on an agency's website that fails to go directly to the agency's current compensation data on that website does not satisfy the intent of the Government Code that information be easily located.
- F4. Regarding compensation policies for elected officials, many public agencies do not provide the public with easy access to information regarding salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees, councils and forums), reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment.

- F5. Regarding detailed disclosure of total compensation paid, most public agencies do not break out all components of compensation paid to their elected officials, including salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees, councils and forums), reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment.
- F6. By comparison to other public agencies, Marin Municipal Water District annually publishes an exemplary report on its website of total compensation paid to its elected officials for salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees), councils and forums, reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment.

# **Recommendations**

- R1. To comply with the intent of Government Code Section 53908, no later than 90 days after the date of this report, agencies should include on their websites a link to the *publicpay.ca.gov* site showing compensation of their elected officials, officers, and employees using the formatted URL examples that are shown in Appendix A.
- R2. No later than 90 days after the date of this report, agencies should modify the location of their existing *publicpay.ca.gov* links to satisfy the requirement of Government Code Section 53908 that their link be "conspicuous." Conspicuous locations for agencies are suggested in Table 2.
- R3. No later than 90 days after the date of this report, agencies should modify their existing *publicpay.ca.gov* links so that they provide a direct link to their current compensation data on the state site. To eliminate the need for annual updates, the URL used for the link should exclude any parameter specifying a year. Formatted URL examples are shown on Appendix A.
- R4. No later than 90 days after the date of this report, in addition to any other compensation links, agencies should include a link on their board or council web pages that leads directly to their "Elected Officials" page on the *publicpay.ca.gov* site, conforming to the format suggested on Appendix A.
- R5. No later than 120 days after the date of this report, agencies should include on their board or council web pages a comprehensive description of their policies regarding all compensation paid to elected officials specifying, at a minimum, salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees, councils and forums), reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment.
- R6. No later than 120 days after the date of this report, agencies should adopt a practice to compile and publish each year an annual report detailing the compensation actually paid to their elected officials for the previous calendar year. Compensation disclosures should include, at a minimum, salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees, councils and forums), reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment. A link to this report should be posted on the agency's board or council web page.

R7. No later than 90 days after the date of this report, agencies not audited in this report should review their websites for compliance with the legal requirements and higher public transparency standards recommended in Recommendations R1–R6 of this report and ensure that their websites include links to the *publicpay.ca.gov* site as shown in Appendix A.

# **Request for Responses**

According to the California Penal Code, agencies required to respond to Grand Jury reports generally have no more than 90 days to issue a response. It is not within the Grand Jury's power to waive or extend these deadlines, and to the Grand Jury's knowledge, the Judicial Council of California has not done so. But we recognize that the deadlines may be burdensome given current conditions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Whether the deadlines are extended or not, it is our expectation that Marin's public agencies will eventually be able to return to normal operations and will respond to this report. In the meantime, however, public health and safety issues are of paramount importance and other matters might need to wait.

Pursuant to Penal Code Section 933.05, the Grand Jury requests responses from the following governing bodies:

# **FINDINGS**

**F4** – Regarding compensation policies for elected officials, many public agencies do not provide the public with easy access to information regarding salary, meeting fees or stipends (including compensation for serving as liaison to other advisory committees, councils and forums), reimbursements, health and retirement benefits, and other benefits such as equipment.

NOTE: The Board of Directors of Sanitary District No. 5 of Marin County would like to point out that while the while the Grand Jury's search for transparency of the boards of the various Special Districts is commendable, it is disheartening that the Grand Jury is thus apparently concerned with FORM, while it does not seem to concern itself with matters of SUBSTANCE, such as why some districts provide extravagant compensation to their directors, including some boards whose members receive such compensation as medical and dental insurance, as well some boards, such as the Marin Municipal Water District, some of whose board members receive compensation in excess of \$20,000 per year. We suggest that the Grand Jury concern itself with requiring that each district justify its ranges of board compensation.

# How sewer science could ease testing pressure and track COVID-19

LONDON (Reuters) - The science of sewage surveillance could be deployed in countries across the world to help monitor the spread of national epidemics of COVID-19 while reducing the need for mass testing, scientists say.

Experts in the field - known as wastewater epidemiology - say that as countries begin to ease pandemic lockdown restrictions, searching sewage for signs of the SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus could help them monitor and respond to flare-ups.

Small early studies conducted by scientific teams in The Netherlands, France, Australia and elsewhere have found signs that the COVID-19-causing virus can be detected in sewage.

"Most people know that you emit lots of this virus through respiratory particles in droplets from the lungs, but what's less well known is that you actually emit more small virus particles in faeces," said Davey Jones, a professor of environmental science at Britain's Bangor University.

This suggests that on a wider scale, sewage sampling would be able to estimate the approximate number of people infected in a geographic area without having to test every person.

"Every time a person becomes infected with COVID-19, they start shedding virus into the sewer system," Jones said. "We're using that (knowledge) and tracking people's toilet movements."

The practice has been used to monitor health threats and viral diseases before.

It's a crucial tool in the global fight to eradicate polio, and scientists in Britain and elsewhere also use it to monitor antibiotic resistance genes from livestock farming.

"Wastewater epidemiology has been part of monitoring of polio infection across the world, so it's not completely new," said Alex Corbishley, a veterinary scientist at the Roslin Institute in Edinburgh who is running a three-month pilot project to track SARS-CoV-2 in wastewater in Scotland. "But it's never really been applied to an outbreak in this way."

"The idea here is that you could potentially use this as a relatively cheap, but much more importantly, scaleable, way of saying 'there's X amount of transmission' in a community."

#### **NOT INFECTIOUS**

Scientists conducting initial COVID-19 sewage studies in Europe and Australia stress that what they are picking up is not live, infectious virus, but dead particles or fragments of the virus's genetic material that are not infectious.

In a pilot trial in Queensland, Australia, scientists were able to detect a gene fragment of SARS-CoV-2 in sewage from two wastewater treatment plants.

In the Netherlands, sewage epidemiologists acted ahead of the COVID-19 outbreak there and took samples from seven cities and a major airport in February and March.

While they found no detectable virus three weeks before the first COVID-19 case was detected, by March 5 - barely a week after the first case was confirmed there - they were able to detect virus fragments.

"The detection of the virus in sewage, even when the COVID-19 prevalence is low, indicates that sewage surveillance could be a sensitive tool to monitor the circulation of the virus," the researchers wrote in a paper posted online on MedRxiv.

Researchers in Paris posted findings in April that showed how sampling wastewater in the city for a month tracked the same curve of the rising and falling epidemic there.

Few countries have the resources or capacity to test each person individually, with most only able to test healthcare workers or people with symptoms severe enough to mean they need hospitalisation. This means authorities have only limited information about how widespread the new coronavirus is or whether it is affecting some communities more than others.

"You can use this type of surveillance as a public health tool," said Andrew Singer, a researcher at the UK Centre for Ecology and Hydrology who is working with Davey and others on pilot coronavirus sewage testing plans in Britain.

"And the utility of this approach is that it's so cheap and the investment that you make ... will reap rewards, not just for (this) coronavirus pandemic," but for future outbreaks too.
